APA Committee on International Relations in Psychology (CIRP)

Operating out of the APA's Office of International Affairs, CIRP disseminates psychological information, supports exchange programs, promotes attendance at international meetings (e.g., the International Scientific Meetings Support Fund), and seeks ties to international organizations (e.g., the WHO). CIRP facilitates the APA's global agenda by assisting psychologists from abroad to acquire scholarly and

professional materials (e.g., the Journal Donations Program), advising them on how to publish in American journals (e.g., the Editorial Mentioning Program), and coordinating national conferences with meetings of international psychological associations. CIRP also encourages efforts to internationalize the psychology curriculum (e.g., the Disaster Management, Humanitarian Relations, and International Peacekeeping program at the University of Hawaii). CIRP also monitors international cases that involve the abuse of psychological knowledge and methods, and the infringement of psychologists' rights. CIRP publishes *Psychology International*.

APA Division of International Psychology (APA52)

APA52 serves psychologists interested in collaborating with colleagues from around the world in the teaching, research, and practice of psychology. Its activities include facilitating transnational research, informing psychologists about assessment and treatment practices worldwide, and encouraging psychologists to visit their counterparts in other countries in order to attend conferences, give lectures and workshops, and pursue advanced training or employment. APA52 has seven standing committees and 14 ad hoc committees that have specific charges related to the goals of the division. For example, the International Liaisons Committee maintains a list and listserv (div52affiliates@listserver.tamu-commerce.edu) of psychologists who represent 73 countries for the purpose of facilitating international collaboration. The Information Clearinghouse Committee maintains the web-based International Psychology Information Clearinghouse, a compendium of information intended to stimulate international collaboration in teaching, research, and consultation. The Clearinghouse contains over 170 entries on careers in international psychology, opportunities in academic and research settings, opportunities in clinical and service agencies, funding for research, support for conferences, travel support, awards, resources for American psychology students, and resources for foreign psychologists and psychology students. Recently, a web technology was developed to enhance communication among psychologists worldwide. PSYCHAT.ORG permits the conversion of written text (e.g., email, web sites) to and from languages, and is now linked to the APA52 web site; the site also features real-time online chat, in which one can write text in one language and send it in another. APA52 also publishes the *International Psychology Reporter*, which is available online.

Archives of History

The Archives of the History of American Psychology (AHAP) was established in 1965 at the University of Akron to promote research in the history of psychology by collecting, cataloguing, and preserving the historical record of psychology. The central feature of the AHAP is the manuscript collection, which includes the papers of over 740 psychologists. Examples of documents contained in a manuscript collection include such items as laboratory notes, lecture notes, and correspondence. This site also includes a Mental Health History Database, which provides a searchable subject-based index to AHAP manuscript collections that contain materials related to mental health. Searching is available by author and/or keyword. The index refers only to processed manuscript collections from the AHAP.

The IUPsyS fosters the global development and exchange of psychological science, whether biological or social, normal or abnormal, pure or applied. It contributes to the exchange of ideas and data and scholars and students, and to networking international and national organizations on matters of shared interest. The IUPsyS has no individual members; rather, it is composed of national psychological organizations. At present, the IUPsyS has 70 country members, representing over 500,000 psychologists. Membership includes most industrial nations, many developing nations, and countries classified by the U.N. as least developed (e.g., Bangladesh, Uganda). The IUPsyS is a global representative for psychology to such bodies as the International Council of Science, World Health Organization, and International Social Sciences Council, among others. The IUPsyS also serves as a clearinghouse for information, with links to national and international (e.g., the IAAP) psychology associations and with a comprehensive international meeting calendar. The IUPsyS sponsors the International Congress of Psychology and publishes the *International Journal of Psychology*, *Psychology: IUPsyS Global Resource*, and the electronic newsletter *IUSPsyS Newslines*, as well as a variety of other works related to psychology (e.g., conference proceedings, calls for papers).

The Open Directory Project is the largest, most comprehensive human-edited directory of the Web. It is constructed and maintained by a vast, global community of volunteer editors. The clinical and counseling category contains information related to scientific research in the fields of clinical and counseling psychology. The content is aimed primarily at academic researchers rather than mental health consumers and includes empirical assessments of novel treatment interventions. Links to top journals, counseling services, and information on child and adolescent, client-centered therapy, and psychoanalysis can also be accessed. The Intelligence category permits access to free IQ tests and emotional intelligence tests and has links to critical articles evaluating general tests of intelligence. The biological category contains information that integrates psychology, biology, and culture at the level of the human body. It emphasizes the key role of embodiment in human experience, development, self-identity, social function, and mental and physical health. Links to top journals in biological psychology and information regarding biofeedback, neurobiology, and evolutionary psychology can be

found. The industrial and organizational category contains information related to the research and practice of the industrial/organizational fields of psychology. The APA's Commission on Ethnic Minority Recruitment, Retention and Training in Psychology (CEMRRAT) offers faculty and professional development grants designed to increase multicultural competence in teaching, research, and practice among psychology faculty. Individual professional development will be considered only if an applicant presents evidence of limited institutional support. CEMRRAT favors proposals for start-up initiatives rather than for maintenance of ongoing projects. There is no standard application form. To apply, submit an application no longer than five pages that describes the project's goals, activities, procedures and expected outcomes, justifies the budget for the requested funding amount, and explains how the proposed effort meets the CEMRRAT funding priorities and plan provisions. In general, CEMRRAT funds may not be used to support travel unless such travel is strongly justified and integral to project objectives.

Opportunities in Academic and Research Settings

Alexander von Humboldt Foundation

Humboldt Research Fellowships support scholars of all nationalities and disciplines so that they may carry out short-term or long-term research projects in Germany. Fellowships are awarded on the basis of academic achievement, quality and feasibility of the proposed research project and candidate's international publications. The program typically provides for a brief stays of up to 3 months and longer in Germany for research at German institutions. Must have a doctoral degree and be less than 40 years of age, and for humanities, have sufficient German proficiency to conduct the proposed research. Max Planck Research Awards for International Cooperation are given to internationally recognized scholars, to conduct long-term, project-oriented cooperative research. Scholars can be of any country and in any discipline. Period is 3 years with possible extension of up to 2 years. Nominations are made by the German side. The TransCoop Program supports research collaboration between German, U.S. and/or Canadian scholars in the humanities, social sciences, law, and economics. Funds are granted for a period of up to 3 years and may be used for short term research stays at the partner's institute for up to 3 months per year, travel expenses, conference organization, material and equipment, printing costs, and staff costs for research assistants working on the project. Project must be matched by funds from U.S. and/or Canadian sources. The Sofja Kovalevskaja Award funds up to EUR 1.2 million per award and enables young scientists and scholars with outstanding research records to concentrate on high-level, innovative research in Germany, virtually without administrative constraints. With the funds provided over four years by the Sofja Kovalevskaja Award, recipients develop and finance a workgroup at a German university or non-university research institution, conduct research of their own design, and finance their living expenses. The program is open to scholars and scientists of all nationalities and in all fields of study who are not resident in Germany. Applicants must be under 35 years of age, have a doctoral degree, and have publications in prestigious refereed journals.

The organization may recruit its prospective Fellow, based on organizational goals, priorities, and needs, or the Fellow may approach an eligible organization, based on his or her professional interests. Organizations have the choice of filling out the form provided or compiling the same information on a computer and printing it out.
